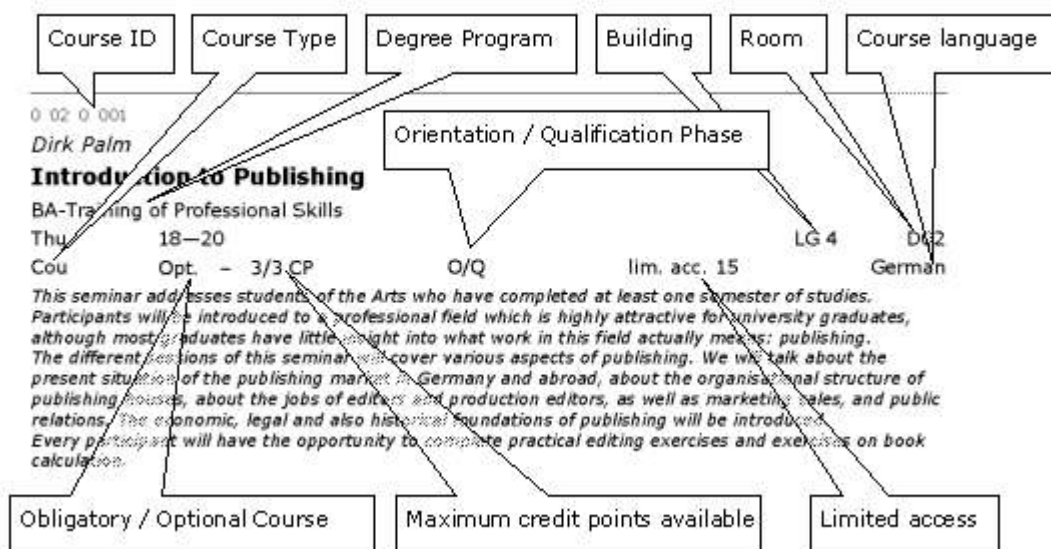

The draft of a world history of cynicism that Peter Sloterdijk gave twenty years ago acts upon the frontiers between philosophy and literature. Sloterdijk's revitalisation of Diogenes and of the concept of cynicism as a means of enlightenment and cultural critique is part of a long tradition of receptions and accommodations. It is the form Diogenes is transmissioned that predisposes him like no other figure of the history of philosophy to become the object of projections, identifications and renewals: there are no texts written by him but only anecdotes about him.

This LV tries to connect the double-faced literary-philosophical history of the 'founding father' and of the concept and the potential of cynicism with the history of its transmission and reception and the intricate interrelations of the literary dimension of philosophy and the philosophical dimension of literature.

Main topics will be: the ancient sources of cynicism, its discussion and its transformations in the Enlightenment (Diderot-Wieland), the new interpretation by Nietzsche who so to say reinvented cynicism for the 20th century, and the 1920ies.

Today, computer games are most popular in common media. In the entertainment industry, the prosperity of computer game production has outranged the success of film production as an economic factor. Computer games essentially form our culture and influence the everyday lives of people independent of age and social background. On the other hand, playing and gaming in interactive media provokes high expectations regarding its impact, and prejudices and uncertainty are widespread in our culture.

According to cultural anthropologist Johan Huizinga (1938), play is "a free activity standing quite consciously outside 'ordinary' life as being 'not serious' but at the same time absorbing the player intensely and utterly. [...] It proceeds within its own proper boundaries of time and space according to fixed rules and in an orderly manner." Beyond mere distraction there are other (more serious and instrumental) motivations for gaming: In military, economy and education it is applied as a professional method since centuries, making use of fault-tolerant environments for simulations and rehearsals. The scope of this lecture series covers current research topics in the field of playing with interactive media, especially of computer games. This concerns questions such as why we experience entertainment in computer games, what are the conditions that let games provoke positive or negative effects (e .g. learning or addiction), the influences of interactive media on social communities, or practical themes around the computer games industry.

The lecture series is organized in cooperation of the University of Erfurt and the Erfurt University of Applied Sciences. Additionally involved is the Erfurt department for Children's Media of the Fraunhofer Institute for Digital Media Technology in Ilmenau.

Starting out from an introduction to English word classes and inflectional morphology, we will go on to discuss the morphological resources English has for creating new words from the inventory of existing words and morphemes. We'll then have a look at how words combine to phrases and how these phrases combine to form still larger units: clauses and sentences. In particular, we will take a look at English phrase structure with a special emphasis on the English verb phrase, at the canonical English clause patterns and the major clause types of English as well as the main possibilities for forming complex sentences by clausal subordination. We will round off our survey of English syntax with a discussion of the discourse-related topic of information-packaging in the clause. The course does not presuppose any background knowledge in English syntax and will give students the opportunity to analyze the syntactic structure of concrete linguistic data.

The criminal novel "Rinaldo Rinaldini" by Goethe's brother-in-law August Vulpius is among the bestsellers of its time. The legend of the foundling *Kaspar Hauser*, an example of a "crime against the soul," fascinated artists from *Eichdorff, Rilke, Wassermann, Klaus Mann, and Peter Handke* to *Reinhard Mey and Werner Herzog*. Discussions of norms and values, models of society and the world were sparked by these literary images of criminals (murderers, swindlers, etc.) Narration immediately became a social construct of criminality. Criminal cases and the development of legal rulings since early modernity became a regular source of inspiration for authors, who fictionalized real events and who contributed to the discourse on crime and criminal justice from the perspective of belletristic literature. This seminar examines these development in German language texts of the 18th through the 20th centuries, and seeks to delineate shifting discursive influences, i.e. the transgression of boundaries. In their works, the authors grapple with legal, moral and medical patterns of interpretation and evaluation of deviant behavior. The authors include, among others, *Christian A. Vulpius, E.T.A. Hoffmann, Theodor Fontane, Alfred Döblin, heodor Lessing, Jakob Wassermann, Thomas Mann, Peter Weiss and Fr. Glauser*. The varied contexts also function as a medium for the social construction and perception of criminality which plumb the depths of legal, sychological and anthropological expert knowledge, namely popularized knowledge concerning legal issues in "case studies." In this manner the seminar will trace the development of the literary portrayal of criminality Furthermore, in this manner we will investigate the transformation of patterns of interpretation, focusing on victims and perpetrators, good/evil, healthy/sick using characteristic examples from literature and films.

Although there is currently much talk of "global consciousness," there is as yet no well founded understanding of the characteristic peculiarities of "foreign" epochs and cultures. It is high time to take the "other" seriously along the lines prescribed by the last European thinker of the Enlightenment, Alexander von Humboldt. Following in Humboldt's tradition, we will interpret various texts and other materials. These will be treated not as self-contained static representations, but rather they will be placed into entirely concrete ConTexts of social "Praxis," that is to say of their discourses. Accordingly, it would be interesting to investigate the history of the language and literatures of German-speaking countries in order to determine during which epochs there was a greater receptivity to foreign cultures, and when people rejected foreign influence. In the course we will use works of literature and other visual arts (of the 18th to the 20th centuries) to investigate the following issues: the perception of oneself and the foreign "other," the instrumentalisation of the "other," the German tradition of enthusiasm for the Orient, fads in travel literature, Asia as a metaphor for the realm of the unconscious, illusion and disillusion in the experience of a foreign culture, the causes of a crisis centering on a critique of one's own European culture, (colonial) Eurocentric cultural zealots with a sense of mission. The seminar will discuss these issues using various works (by J.W. Goethe, Karl May, Max Dauthendey, Norbert eber, Hermann Hesse, Hermann Graf Keyserling Alfred Döblin, Bert Brecht, Annemarie Schwarzenbach etc.).

The concept of Practical Theology is founded on the biblically testified event of revelation, which, according to the Second Vatican Council, "is realized by deeds and words having in inner unity" (Dei Verbum 2).

This event of revelation is inextricably linked to the words and acts of Jesus Christ. He is both the messenger and the message, and therefore he is the foundation of all those acts performed and words proclaimed in his name. This way theology is realized between the poles of word and act, action and thought, content and interaction.

So pastoral action is always embedded in personal encounters and patterns of interaction in which words and acts have a share in giving witness of the Gospel of Jesus Christ - or in its denial. This lecture will deal with these basic conditions of a theologically justified "praxis of faith".

The Sunni Orthodoxy had to comply with this reality, although they were still opposed to it. This Seminar will follow this sometimes strained development. Therefore the concept of veneration of saints and miracles by saints in Islam will be presented. There will be a special stress on the development in Shii Islam as the veneration of saints is part of the official Shii creed. Other Aspects are the points "Female Saints" and the special case of the "Marabout", the saint of the Maghreb. The course "constitution of finance and law of budget" deals with the main features of the German constitution of finance as well as the essential basics of the law of budget.

The constitution of finance regulates the financial relationships between federation and states. Regarding the field of financial relations both under constitutional law and regulated by single law between federation and states, particularly the allocation of expenses and the allocation of the legislature of tax revenue will be subject of the course.

According to article 109 paragraph 1 of the constitutional law, federation and states are autonomous in their economy of budget and independent from each other. The autonomy of budget under constitutional law leads to federation and states having to create their own budgets each. The dealing with the national budget focuses on the law of budget of the state of Thuringia, takes into account the embedding of the economy of budget in a perennial plan of finance and aims at the economical system marked by the setting-up of budget, its accomplishment (execution of budget) and the financial control.

Slavery existed in the Near East even in Pre-Islamic times. The Quran mentions slavery as normal institution, but stipulates a better treatment of slaves than in Pre-Islamic times. Based on Quranic evidence the Muslim law schools developed the Islamic slave law, which stipulates among other things that a free Muslim can never be enslaved, but a Slave who converts to Islam is not automatically to be freed. Although the Islamic slave law improved the status of slaves, slave rebellions still happened, like the revolt of the Zanj (869-883) in Iraq. Another vital element of the course will be the institution of Military Slavery, which is quite uniquely restricted to the Muslim realm. The slave dynasty of the Mamluks, masters of Egypt and Syria between 1250-1517, is the most striking example. A rather dark chapter of Muslim slavery is the enslavement of black Africans by Arab slave traders for the exportation to Arabia, Persia, India and China. The class will then be concluded by discussing the history of the abolition of slavery in the Muslim world during the 19th century, although in some remote areas of the Arabian peninsula and Africa slaves are to be found until today.
